

Carroll Kenworthy

KENNETT SQUARE, Pa. — Carroll Kenworthy, former Foreign Editor of United Press International in Washington, D.C., died here Sunday, April 18, 1993. He was 88.

Kenworthy was editor and manager of the International department of UPI from July 1941 until retirement in May 1967. The department sent radio and cable news to 2,500 newspapers and TV stations in 110 countries.

In addition to supervision of the international staff, he wrote daily articles for this service, covering such events as White House news conferences, the visits of foreign Presidents, Prime Ministers and other notables, Congressional debates and diplomatic actions.

He was twice president of Overseas Writers, an organization of Washington newsmen with foreign experience.

Born May 10, 1904, in Kokomo, Ind., he attended public schools in Indiana, Massachusetts and New York state, then Oakwood in Poughkeepsie, N.Y.

In 1925, he graduated from Earlham College and in 1927 received a master's degree from Columbia University. His first full time newspaper work was for the Hartford (Conn.) Courant. Next he worked for nearly three years for the Japan Advertiser, an American newspaper published in Tokyo with wide circulation in Asia.

Returning to the U.S. in 1929, he worked for the Wall Street Journal, then joined the old United Press to write international news.

In 1932, he married Mary Lowes of Cincinnati.
