**MRS. LUCY KENWORTHY OF  
NEW LONDON DIES SUNDAY  
AT LOCAL HOSPITAL**

Mrs. Lucy (Newlin) Kenworthy, 80, of New London, died at 10 o'clock Sunday morning at St. Joseph's hospital, where she was brought six weeks ago with a broken hip caused by a fall in the living room of her home. She seemed somewhat stronger Saturday evening, but her weakened heart was not able to withstand the shock resulting from the injury.

Mrs. Kenworthy was born one mile southeast of New London, Nov. 30, 1856, daughter of Elmri and Isabella (Chapman) Newlin, pioneer citizens of New London community who settled there in the autumn of 1846. She received her education in the New London school and at Indiana State Normal School at Terre Haute. She taught in the public schools of Howard county and the city of Kokomo. She was instructor in the second grade in the old normal school for three years, from 1885 to 1898.

She was a birthright member of the Society of Friends and a continuous member of the New London meeting for more than 80 years, serving faithfully in all church activities, filling the position of elder for about 45 years.

In the autumn of 1888 she was married to Milton Kenworthy who survives with one son Murray of Amboy. One other son, Earl Kenworthy, preceded her in death May 6, 1936. Surviving also are one brother, William Newlin of St. Petersburg, Fla., five grandchildren and a number of nieces and nephews. The nieces include: Mrs. Minnie Wilson of St. Petersburg, Fla., Mrs. Edna Penfield of Lawrence, Kas., Mrs. Marie Hadley and Mrs. Gladys Boyer of Kokomo; nephews, Emmons Tucker of Kokomo and Ben Tucker of New London. The grandchildren are: Clarence Kenworthy of West Middleton, Paul Kenworthy and Kathryn Wyant of New London, Carroll Kenworthy of Washington, D. C., Wilmer Kenworthy of State College, Pa., and Leonard of Greenwich, Conn.

Funeral services will be conducted at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning at New London Friends church with the Rev. Frank Stafford in charge. Burial will be in New London cemetery. The body may be viewed at the church from 9 to 10 a. m. Tuesday. The casket will not be opened after the service.
