

FREDERICK GARBERT DEATH.

Old Age and Injury Result In Death
After Short Illness.

Frederick W. Garbert died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. James M. Elmore, 529 South Indiana avenue, Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the ripe old age of 86. His advanced age and the physical strain resulting from a hip which he broke in a fall recently, were too much for his vitality. He died after two weeks of suffering.

The deceased was born in Germany December 27, 1827. He was married in Germany, coming to this country with his wife in 1855, settling in Indianapolis, where he followed the machinist's trade for several years. Later he took up farming at which he labored during most of his later life.

In 1879 the family moved to this county, Ervin township. The deceased leaves a sixty-acre farm there that he acquired by careful management and hard work.

His wife preceded him in death by twelve years.

During the last few years of his life his mental faculties were clouded at times and it was during one of these attacks that he fell from his bed, breaking his hip.

Seven children survive, namely: A. W. Garbert, of near Noblesville; Mrs. Elmore, of this city; Frederick C. Garbert, of Ervin township; Mrs. Sophia Turley, of near Galveston; Charles W. Garbert, also of near Galveston; Mrs. Nora Hiatt, of near Greentown; and Mrs. Minnie Lindsay of Van Buren.

Throughout his life the deceased was a devoted member of the German Lutheran church. The services will be held from that church, near Kappa, probably Tuesday. The arrangements have not been completed as yet.
