

Minister's Daughter's Death Shocks the Community.

Miss Ruby Loveless aged nine
teen years, daughter of Rev. W.
E. and Mrs. Loveless of this vil-
lage, died at the Methodist hos-
pital at Indianapolis on Sunday
evening, Nov 26th, following an
operation for appendicitis follow-
ing an illness of but two days.
She had been employed at the W.
H. Turner store at Kokomo sev-
eral months. Her father was
pastor of Beamer Chapel church
at Kokomo for three years before
being sent here as pastor of the
M. E. Church and thus the family
had gathered a large number of
friends and acquaintances who
most deeply sympathize with the
sorrowing ones. Becoming seri-
ously ill Friday Miss Ruby was
brought to her home here that
evening and a physician who af-
ter thorough examination gave
his opinion that an operation was
necessary. She was taken at
once to Indianapolis where the op-
eration was performed on Satur-
day and was followed by her
death on Sunday evening at sev-
en-forty o'clock.

The body was brought home
Monday and prepared for the fu-
neral which was held on Wed-
nesday, November 29th, at 2:30
o'clock at the M. E. church of
which her father is the pastor.

Long before the hour had ar-
rived the church was filled to
overflowing. Rev. F. A. Hall,
the District Superintendent, in
charge of the services, was as-
sisted by Rev. W. T. Arnold of
Grove M. E. Church of Kokomo;
Rev. Frank P. Morris of Main
street M. E. church, of Kokomo;
Rev. Charles Dunlap of Gold-
smith, Ind., and Rev. C. Cook of
Forest. Rev. Hall delivered the
special message in a very im-
pressive manner from the text,
"She is not dead, but sleepeth."
Music appropriate for the oc-

casion was furnished by the Shi-
loh mixed quartet and Mrs. Dew-
ey Thatcher sang some beautiful
solos.

The Queen Esther girls acted
as flower girls and pall bearers.

There was a beautiful floral
collection sent by her many
friends showing their love and
sympathy. Among the flowers
were roses, rose buds, carnations,
calla lillies, and various colors of
chrysanthemums large and small.

Beamer M. E. Church Kokomo,
where Rev. Loveless was pastor
before coming to Russiaville, sent
a broken wheel of white and yel-
low chrysanthemums with spokes
of pink roses and white carna-

Blue Ultra class of which Ruby
was a member while they lived
in Kokomo.

Turner Co., Kokomo, of which
Ruby was one among them just a

daughter of the manager of the
Turner store, having become very
much attached to Ruby, sent as
